Summary :

In light of the escalating humanitarian crisis in Sudan and rising food insecurity indicators, CEYD implemented a strategic humanitarian project during the Holy Month of Ramadan 2026 to distribute Zakat al-Fitr. The project targeted families in North Darfur and Kassala states. This was not merely a traditional relief operation, but a calculated humanitarian intervention combining deep administrative precision with a noble humanitarian spirit, based on principles of transparency, accountability to affected populations, and community empowerment.

By distributing 45 tons of grain (Sorghum/Millet), the project contributed to providing emergency food cover for 5,400 individuals. Notably, 65% of the beneficiaries were women, reflecting a genuine commitment to empowering the most vulnerable groups. This intervention was designed as a bridge toward sustainability, linking immediate relief with social cohesion and supporting the local economy to ensure every dollar spent achieved maximum humanitarian and ethical impact.

Humanitarian context and challenges :

Targeted areas suffer under a multi-dimensional crisis: ongoing armed conflict in North Darfur has led to mass displacement from El Fasher toward the Tawila camp, while Kassala suffers from climate change impacts, recurring droughts, and the collapse of traditional agricultural livelihoods. This has created an environment of chronic vulnerability where food insecurity intersects with weak basic services, making humanitarian intervention an urgent moral necessity



Targeted groups :

Priority was given to the most vulnerable groups through a wide geographical spread:

- Newly displaced persons from El Fasher in Tawila Camp.
- Female-headed households.
- Widows, orphans, the elderly, and people with disabilities.
- Communities in rural and poverty-stricken areas.

Procedures and coordinations :

Communication was established with official authorities and local administrations in North Darfur and Kassala, as well as community leaders, to approve the following plan:

1. Agreement on the appropriate types of food materials available that represent the greatest need.
2. Coordination with the Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) in Kassala to determine implementation sites.
3. Field survey visits to verify candidates for the program.
4. Adoption of direct delivery to the beneficiary.
5. Formation of a joint implementation team including members from the HAC and community leaders.
6. Contracting experienced suppliers to provide materials well in advance.
7. Coordination of transport, logistics, and work permits.



Implementation Method :

4

1. Packaging food materials in bags according to the family share.
2. Verifying beneficiary lists prior to distribution.
3. Organizing the receipt of food shares according to coordinated lists.
4. Preparing safe and suitable locations for the safety of beneficiaries.
5. Diversifying delivery methods, including reaching some beneficiaries at their homes.

Social outcomes of the programme :

- Providing food shares sufficient for one month.
- Increasing community trust in humanitarian organizations.
- Food security allowed families to save expenses for other essential needs.
- Strengthening the spirit of humanitarian cooperation and solidarity.

Voice from the field :

- **Hajja Zainab (IDP from El Fasher, Tawila Camp):** «We fled under hellish conditions from people with no hearts. After reaching Tawila, we felt safe, but we had no food or clothes for our children. I am elderly and support my family; I couldn't afford a bag of sorghum. This help was a mercy from God that allowed me to feed my children.»
- **Sheikh Saleh (Shambob Village, Kassala):** «The rains last year were not like before, and our harvest was insufficient. This aid came at the perfect time, especially for families supported by the elderly. I received my share at my doorstep, and I am now reassured that my children have enough to live on for a while.»
